

Dear FO° Supporter,

I am writing this two days after Christmas in New York City. I walked through the bustling crowds near the ice rink and Christmas tree in Rockefeller Center. I also explored the quiet streets of Tribeca and West Soho. Unlike London, this city does not feel like home, but it exerts a strong pull on me. While walking through Times Square, I ran into Moroccans who live in France, Muhajirs who have made Lahore their home, Bolivians from La Paz, Aussies from Sydney looking for a good pub for a night out, and devout Catholics from Abidjan in Côte d'Ivoire marveling at the flashing lights of the Big Apple. Both Christianity and Islam are universalist, but both also have had too many schisms to recount. The United Nations General Assembly in Paris proclaimed the Universal Declaration of Human Rights over 75 years ago, but most nations fall far short of this creed, and many do not even pay lip service to it.

A few days ago, one of our donors remarked that Francis Fukuyama was indeed right and that the populist revolt against globalization was a blip. As I walked through New York, I had to concede that he had a point. Yet I cannot entirely agree with him. As another dear friend, Olivier Lavinal, points out repeatedly, there has been an eternal tension between the universal and the particular. The Taliban in Afghanistan or the Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS) in Syria certainly do not want any of their cities to turn into New York. At Fair Observer, we experience that universal–particular tension all the time. On the one hand, we have editorial guidelines that apply to everyone who publishes with us. On the other hand, we accept that people's diverse contexts, experiences, personalities, values and cultures shape their perspectives. Sometimes, this creates challenges. What we publish often irritates some of our readers. At times, it offends them. Applying our guidelines to controversial topics is tricky and demands judgment, which even at its finest is imperfect. So yes, we sometimes fall short in applying the universal to the particular.

Yet that is the thin needle we thread in our contentious times. You might ask why we do what we do. I will give you a simple answer. Discussion and debate are the twin pillars of a functioning democracy where people learn to agree to disagree. In this era of algorithms feeding us exactly what we

like and driving us down rabbit holes, Fair Observer makes us see the world through many prisms.

Ours is a citizen-supported and citizen-driven new model of journalism. Billionaires do not own us. Governments do not control us. Venture capitalists maximizing returns for their investors do not back us. In the age of increasing inequality, we are that rare creature: an independent nonprofit. So, we inform and educate our readers with no other competing motives to cloud our actions. In 2024, we made great strides in creating what one of our young donors and authors called "a crucible of collaboration." The FO° Community meets both online and offline to deepen this spirit. From the drawing board in Philadelphia in 2010, to our launch in Washington, DC, in 2011, to our near-death in 2013 and our reinvention

Citizens power our content production. Our nearly 3,000 authors come from over 90 countries. Our editors, who do the valiant task of fact-checking and making our pieces readable, come from around the world. More often than not, they come through our Young Editors Program, which we have pioneered and which one alumna has called "a fast-track masters course in international relations." Education defines our core team, which conducts Oxford-style tutorials every Saturday with young editors over a video call, poring over maps, encyclopedias and other sources to produce the finished products you enjoy on our website.

thanks to a Kickstarter campaign that raised a mere \$35,001, we have come a long way.

As we enter our 15th year, we have big plans for 2025. We are more committed to our mission than ever, and we have learned from the school of hard knocks. We ask you to join us in a journey at a time when independent journalism that combines global coverage with local insights matters more than ever. We rely entirely on your support. In 2024, Fair Observer helped many young authors learn the ropes of both editing and writing through the FO° Young Editors Program.

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
